STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The Society registered as a charity on 25 April 1975 under registration number 266383. The charity is governed by its constitution, which was adopted on 12 May 2014.

The Society is affiliated to the Richard Wagner Verband International, the International Association of Wagner Societies.

Committee Members are elected for three-year terms at annual general meetings by rotation with at least one-third resigning each year and who are also eligible to stand for re-election.

In the above list, dates of appointment are all the dates of Committee meetings or the AGM; those of resignation are the date of the last Committee meeting attended, the date of the formal notification of resignation (if any), or the date upon which the Chairman notified the Committee of such resignation, depending on the specific circumstances of each resignation.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Principal objectives

The principal objectives of the charity are as follows:-

- 1. To advance education in and appreciation of the life and work of Richard Wagner.
- 2. To promote and organise public performances anywhere in the world of the works of Richard Wagner by the Society from time to time and for special purposes include in the Society's programmes suitable works by other composers.
- 3. To promote and organise other cultural and educational activities relevant to the study and appreciation of the music of Richard Wagner.

Activities

To achieve the above objectives the Society:-

- 1. Arranges meetings, events and study days to enable members to further their understanding and appreciation of the life and works of Richard Wagner. It also arranges events at which singers, directors, conductors etc. of Wagner productions talk about and discuss their work.
- 2. Publishes at regular intervals the magazine, Wagner News, which is distributed free of charge to members.
- 3. Provides financial help to fund the coaching of young singers of Wagner and provides a bursary to enable young musicians to visit Bayreuth each year for its Scholarship Programme ("Stipendienstiftung").
- 4. Provides opportunities for young singers to perform Wagner in public and to take part in competitions.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Chairman's Report

2019 has been another transformative year for the Society, and in a wide variety of areas. We have had a change in the Officers of the Committee. Richard Miles stepped down as Chairman of the Society to become Secretary, and I was unanimously elected to replace him. We would like to thank Richard for all his hard work over the last seven years through what might have seemed like very difficult times for the Society. Ray Godson has also stepped down from the Committee after years of service in a variety of roles and we wish him well although we shall certainly be seeing him at Society events. We have also looked to build on the changes we have been making in the last year in terms of our presentation as well as in our statutory duties as trustees.

Our Events Secretary, Henry Kennedy, continues to book an innovative, exciting and extremely high-quality series of events to build on the successes of 2019 with far reaching plans into 2020, and we will detail these below. For the first time this year, we held our Singing Competition at the Wigmore Hall, with a panel of judges from the practical business of the opera world chaired by Nicholas Kenyon, and we include more details in its own section below. Our quarterly magazine Wagner News has also gone from strength to strength; tripling in size, covering a wider range of events, reviews and academic viewpoints in a greater degree of curiosity and investigation, and our contributors include not only Society members, but well-respected members of the academic community. It is with pride that we send copies to the copyright libraries in the UK as well as the Wahnfried archive at Bayreuth itself.

The emphasis has been on raising the quality of all aspects of the Society. We are not just a collection of people Interested in the music of Richard Wagner but a society with a prescribed aim. Like our parent organization, the Richard Wagner Verband International (RWVI), we have an aim of promoting the work of Richard Wagner, promoting the careers of young artists, and supporting the annual Bayreuth Festival. Our association with Bayreuth makes us unique amongst music societies because of the unique nature of the legacy of Richard Wagner himself. There is nowhere in the world where an annual festival takes place involving works composed by one man in a theatre designed and built by that man, which has continued since 1876. The earliest London Wagner Society was started to support the Bayreuth Festival, and we provide support by financial contributions to the RWVI according to the size of our membership by which we are able to obtain tickets for the annual festival for our members. As well as the annual festival, in 1882 Richard Wagner started a Bursary programme for all young artists to attend the festival and education events associated with it, and we carry on that association today. 2019 has allowed us to strengthen our relationship with both these organisations, as well as the Friends of Bayreuth, and the museum at Wagner's house at Wahnfried. At the 2019 festival I was invited by the RWVI to attend their Bayreuth committee meeting to describe our activities and strengthen our relationship, and acted as guide to the students we sent this year on our Bursary programme. We also met with the staff at the Wahnfried archives, where we have donated over one hundred volumes of English studies of the works of Wagner that they were missing from their collection, and we hope to work with them further on publicising their events as well as raising funds for the restoring of old manuscripts.

Our importance as a Society was also underlined at the recent RWVI conference in Venice, where the primary purpose was to elect the new committee of the Verband but was also an opportunity to meet again with senior figures in the international and regional societies, as well as from the Bursary programme. This conference also made it clear, with our efforts to increase the membership of the society, that we were now the largest Wagner Society in the world. This gives us the financial opportunities to support and promote young singers, performances or academic concerns, and to support institutions, for example, such as through our donations to the publication *The Wagner Journal* and to the Friends of Bayreuth.

This year's events have been a fascinating mix of singers, conductors, and academics. We opened the year with a talk by John Lundgren, Wotan at Bayreuth for five years, who although in London to sing in Pique Dame, had just sung Wotan in the Ring the previous year. He spoke to us about his career and choice of roles. After this talk, we also asked him if he would join our Honorary Members programme of distinguished performers and artists, who help us support the Society. In March we invited another

potential Wotan, Brindley Sherratt, to talk to us. This was a wonderful event with a very big-hearted man, and it was disappointing that the attendance at this meeting was not as high as it could have been because of the scheduling difficulties we sometimes face due to a singer's calendar. Two conductors spoke to the Society about two very different topics. A great friend of the Society, Anthony Negus, spoke to us prior to his conducting Das Rheingold at the Longborough Festival, demonstrating examples with the help of Mark Le Broq singing the role of Loge. The second conductor was Alexander Walker who spoke to us about how the music of Edward Elgar has been influenced by Elgar's admiration for Wagner.

We also invited more academic subjects to be discussed with the Society, including the life and reputation of Mathilde Wesendonck in a talk given by Judith Cabaud to a packed hall, and how Parsifal expressed Wagner's disgust at organised religion in a talk given by the pastor Dr. John Mastrogiovanni. Parsifal is a very popular lecture subject and last year we were also visited by the late Sir Roger Scruton, who was writing a book on Parsifal and wanted to explain some ideas to us. This talk, to a capacity hall, highlighted the complexity of the opera and its variety of possible meanings, and we hope that the book was completed before his sudden death this year. In fact, in the audience was the doctor who advised him he should check his health that lead to his unfortunate diagnostic.

In the autumn, the second (since being revived) Dame Eva Turner Memorial Lecture given by Barry Millington and his subject was performing Wagner's operas in the modern age. We were fortunate that we were then allowed to publish the lecture in full in Wagner News. This lecture was a very down to earth appreciation of Wagnerian productions including the recent Covent Garden Ring, whose director Keith Warner was present at the event. Also present was our next speaker, and fellow editorial board member of The Wagner Journal, Dr. Roger Allen. He gave us a detailed lecture on Wilhelm Furtwängler and his involvement in Nazi Germany as well as reviewing the reaction to Dr. Allen's own recently published book on the subject.

But the Society is not all about lectures. The social side of the Society always contains two events, which are looked forward to by members. The first is the annual Christmas party, where we have to thank our Treasurer, Neil King, for his generosity in opening up his house for the Society and for allowing it to be a fund-raising event for the Society. The second is the Society's Annual Dinner at the Royal Over-Seas League where we also award the annual Goodall Award. The winners receiving the award at the 2019 dinner were the Grahams from the Loughborough Festival Opera, who have achieved fantastic results in their Wagnerian performances every summer as part of their festival. The dinner was a great success both in terms of numbers as well in the level of enjoyment for members. The Society needs to thank members of the Committee who made this event possible through their sponsorship including Neil King for the wines, spirits and Champagne, and Richard Miles and Anthony Spooner for their generosity with other costs.

Because of our serious attention to the marketing, presentation and high quality of our events involving significant figures in the world of Wagnerian performance and study, the number of attendees to our events has definitely increased, and we have established ourselves as a Society aiming high in its goals. The standard of presentation of our speakers, the quality of the social aspects of the events as well as the creation of an environment where Wagnerian studies can be undertaken in a serious atmosphere has meant that the Society is being viewed in a highly positive manner by the Wagnerian world. This was underlined by the location and attendance of the 2019 Singing Competition, and our reputation at the Bayreuth Festival itself.

But we do not want to stop here. We already have great plans for 2020 regarding boosting our membership numbers, transforming our website, archiving our Society records and publications, and extending our ability to support and promote related activities where possible. We are always looking for people to join the committee to help us achieve these aims; there is a lot to do and more we could achieve. We intend to build on our successes, our healthy financial position, and our reputation in 2020. The largest Wagner Society in the world is certainly the busiest.

Wagner Society's Singing Competition 2019

The Wagner Society's Singing Competition at the Wigmore Hall was one of the highlights of our 2019 calendar and this year attracted our highest audience numbers ever and finalists of high calibre as well as an expert panel of judges (in alphabetical order):-

We had over thirty applicants by the deadline about half of whom were then auditioned by Dame Anne Evans and Henry Kennedy in late-September resulting in seven finalists for the competition on 23rd November 2019. Each were required to sing a piece of Wagner and also a piece by another composer, both of their own choosing, and this resulted in an enjoyable programme for the event.

Whilst the judges deliberated on their verdict, some of the audience joined the committee for a hot lunch (although over-estimating the timing of the morning's performances resulted in the cheese course being consumed before the main course) and gave the members a chance to consider their own verdicts for the audience prize and there was much enjoyable discussion.

All winners and finalists also receive Alumni Membership of the Wagner Society to allow us all to stay in touch in the future and follow the progress of their careers.

A reception for the judges and all finalists' friends and families was held after the competition to allow informal discussion of the result between judges and finalists, and also to thank everybody taking part. The event was organised by several members of the committee: Henry Kennedy (auditions and artistic issues), Neil King (administration and members' receptions), Alan Ridgewell (programmes).

Donations

 - b. during the dispersal of the libraries, many members made donations in lieu of payment for items that they received. This includes bequests of items for resale by the Wagner Society.

In addition to this financial support, donations in kind were also received, primarily relating to the Annual Dinner and Christmas Party, as follows:

- 1. Champagne, wines, port and cognac for the annual dinner were donated by Neil King, Treasurer.
- 2. The Goodall Award trophy (lead crystal rose bowl) was donated by Jan Leigh, a former Committee Member.
- 3. Champagne, wine, food and other refreshments for the Christmas Party were donated by Neil King, Treasurer.

The Wagner Society is sincerely grateful all Members who made donations (in cash or in kind) during 2019.

Grants made

The guest speaker at the Eva Turner Memorial Lecture, Barry Millington, asked for his fee to be given to the Wagner Journal of which he is editor. Given the success of the evening and the obvious amount of time that had gone into its preparation, the Society added a further £300 to this donation to the Wagner Journal and this is accounted for under Donations and Grants in note 7.

Further grants were made to Fulham Opera (£1,000) for their production of Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg and Grimeborn (£500) for their production of Das Rheingold.

Joint membership is available for two individuals living at the same address but sharing mailings, in particular, only receiving one copy of *Wagner News*. The number of 390 joint members shown above therefore represents 195 joint membership subscriptions received.

Wagner News

There were three editions of Wagner News edited by Alan Ridgewell, Chairman.

Financial review and investment policy

The principal sources of income were membership subscriptions received, donations, and sale of tickets for events.

Members of the Committee and others, including professionals, give their time voluntarily to the charity and often bear some of the incidental postage, stationery, entertaining and travelling expenditure personally. No member of the Committee received any remuneration in respect of their duties (2018: £nil).

Income received is spent on the principal objectives and the running costs of the charity; total income during the year amounted to £107,072 and direct charitable expenditure amounted to £97,363 making net incoming resources for the year of £9,709. The amount of £10,954, being an unrealised gain on investments held, is added to this surplus giving a final net surplus of £20,663 to be carried forward. Funds brought forward from previous years totalled £75,949 and therefore total funds carried forward at 31 December 2019 are £96,612.

There are no restrictions on the charity's power to invest.

Full details of the financial results of the year are shown in the statement of financial activities on page 12 and the relevant notes on pages 14-17.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain funds at a level sufficient to finance all future planned activities.

Risk management

The trustees actively review the major risks which the charity may face on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at current levels, combined with regular reviews of the controls over key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources to cover future commitments as well as headroom for unforeseeable events. The trustees have also examined other operational and business risks faced by the charity and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in compliance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting for Charities, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102 1A) and the Charities Act 2011.

Incoming resources

Voluntary income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Members' subscriptions are spread over the period of their membership, which could straddle two financial years; donations and gifts are accounted for when they are received.

Income tax recoverable on members' subscriptions and donations is recognised only when a valid Gift Aid return is completed and submitted to HMRC.

Legacies are accounted for as soon as the Committee is notified of the amount of any bequest.

Income from investments

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable. Tax recoverable, if any, on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

Gains and losses on investments

Realised gains or losses are recognized when investments are sold. Unrealised gains or losses are accounted for on revaluation of investments at 31 December each year.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rate in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:-

Equipment

33% on cost

Stock

Stock comprises CDs, opera tickets for resale and postage stamps. Stock is valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Value added tax

Costs are inclusive of input value added tax, which is not recoverable by the charity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities and is not registered for VAT.

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:-

Unrestricted funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds – these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Currently the charity has no restricted funds.
